

Skills Seminar

Structural repairs: challenges and solutions

Eventually all boat owners come to the realization that the boat they love is aging and needs some work beyond his/her own abilities to keep her seaworthy. Structural rebuilding of a wooden boat can be daunting to consider. And one of the largest wooden yachts on California's coast is the 65' ketch ALERT which needed new frames and planks below the water line. But with the right skills, perspective and good planning, even projects of a grand scale can be handled quickly and efficiently, resulting in a boat that is many ways better than new but at far less cost than a new boat.

Two very different perspectives will be presented at this Skill Seminar offered for the first time at Koehler Kraft on Sunday March 9, at 3:00pm. presenters will be the new owner of ALERT, Mr. Doug McClellen, who will share with us his insights on making a decision of this magnitude and what was learned during the specification and contracting phase of the job. Also, the project manager and foreman, CF Koehler, will share with us the variety of techniques that were selected to make the job proceed quickly and within budget, giving us the opportunity to pick up some new ideas for repairing our own boats and what to expect when we need to take that step. The two of them will reflect on some typical hurdles that can be encountered and solved from their opposite sides of the cash flow and materials management, and how expectations are managed through close involvement between the boat owner and shipyard owner at all phases to produce high quality work that the owner participated in and is proud of.

Hamburgers will be available immediately after the Seminar and everyone is invited to stay and enjoy Koehler Kraft's hospitality. An amazing collection of photographs recorded ALERT's original construction and they have been loaned to the project by the foreman from Stone Shipyard where she was built. You'll be able to compare the original construction phases with where she is today as she is being closed up in anticipation of her re-launching after a very fast-moving rebuild. Other boats at various stages of restructuring will also be on hand for comparison.
